

Thoughts Looking Forward from Erin

I write this particular letter to you while attending a conference in a rather chilly Melbourne. The conference is entitled 'Re-imagining Home' a gathering with several keynote speakers and interactive electives. A place where we are reminded of the changing nature of our lands due to migration, and the challenging questions that seek a reply from us all. Questions which ask... How do we all experience 'home' in our place of being? What do people need to belong? And how as Christians will we respond? I am attending the conference in my role as Mission Advisor for the Synod of Otago and Southland, but Presbyterian Women Aotearoa NZ has been at the forefront of my thinking.

At yesterday's chapel time, we went on a quick journey using a map of the all towns mentioned in the Gospels, and interestingly the towns not mentioned. One particular comment caught my attention as we travelled across the mapped landscape. While somewhat less geographical, nonetheless it was an important point! That being, the only ones to serve (or minister) in the Gospels were the angels, the women and Jesus – the disciples hadn't quite worked out that their role was to serve.

Over these few days there have been stories of how migrants, refugees, asylum seekers have been welcomed into urban and rural settings. Often with the lead taken by women meeting women and very practically helping each other. PWANZ's involvement with the United Nations, and the awareness this relationship provides, have been (and continue to be) vital in our ministering to women. Over the next month, you will see invitations for expressions of interest in the role of PWANZ United Nations Convener. A suitable applicant is sought to continue the good work of Rev Carol Grant. Please prayerfully consider this role and pray for the right woman to arise.

As an Executive, we have been discussing our desire to better communicate the PWANZ vision; along with all the work we and all the other groups are involved. So likewise, you will see calls for Expressions of Interest for someone to fill a Communications Portfolio on the Executive. Are you (or do you know someone) passionate about communication and modern methods of getting the message out there? Can you help us reach the wider church by conveying and sharing in the work of PWANZ? If so, please consider this portfolio, or encourage others who are suitable to apply. And lastly, I would like to mention the PWANZ Women's Assembly (details are within this Bushfire). Registrations are slowly trickling in. As previously mentioned, I'm writing this while attending a conference. Before I flew across the Tasman, the logistics and time frames had combined to make my enthusiasm for this event a little less than it should have been. However, being with a group of people who are learning together, eating together, and sharing stories together is a powerful thing! It has been extremely inspiring as we learn from older and younger alike. I believe that as we encourage each other, we too are growing and actually kingdom building. Before going to Melbourne, I received a phone call from a young woman who had heard about the upcoming Women's Assembly. She was so excited about it, so looking forward to being in a space with women of all ages. She said that this doesn't happen very often and she's eagerly awaiting November 3rd-5th to come around.

The question is, Will YOU be one of the Women she talks with at the Assembly? Will You be one to encourage her, or perhaps receive encouragement from her? Obviously to do so, one must first enrol to attend!

Presbyterian Women - Funding Update

As at the end of the current financial year, 30 June 2017 (unaudited), 640 members have contributed nearly \$31,000 in donations to mission. Plus in June, Levin Uniting donated \$200 to forward to the CWS South Sudan Famine Appeal, and our PWANZ Mission Convenor topped this with \$300 from the Emergency Aid funds collected over the year. Yes, your Group's \$10 applied to the Emergency Aid counts.

Thank you for all your work and support **Sally Missions Convenor**

The **Hawkes Bay Presbyterial** recently heard from Lisa, one of the FASD-CAN mothers, who explained with good humor about his life and difficulties. Alcohol damages the developing foetus at all stages of pregnancy and results in brain damage. Lack of concentration, impulsivity and lack of memory affect these children and place great stress on families.

Lisa said there are things we can do: Pressure our MPs to provide adequate funding for teacher aides in schools. This is a good question for any upcoming election debates you may attend.

Drinking alcohol any time in pregnancy affects the developing foetus so our young women need to be aware of this. The alcohol consumption rates for women generally have risen and the damage may be done before a woman realizes she is pregnant.

United Nations Comment

One of the delights I have discovered after leading the various delegations to the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women on behalf of PWANZ, is seeing the ripples circling out from delegation members on their return into the church and wider community. Since I became UN Convenor more than thirty talented ordained and lay women and girls have accompanied me to New York to the UN Commission on the Status of Women. Leading delegations takes heaps of organisational time, individual contact with those who first express interest, and finally those who make the commitment to be a self-funded member of each successive PWANZ delegation. Detailed planning before leaving, whilst at the UN Commission, and after returning home is vital to make sure the delegation goes safely and successfully from planning stage to final completion.

I am very grateful for the amazing support I have received during my term for this and the ongoing national and international work from PW women and others around New Zealand. The encouraging phone calls and emails of each time I write an article in Bush Fire or Bush Telegraph have meant a great deal.

To be a member of the PWANZ delegation costs each of us our own savings, may involve fundraising, and annual leave allowances, unless specifically funded as one person was by their employer. I deeply appreciate the financial support I have received from the PWANZ special funds set aside by wise and faithful women of the past for this national and international work - it is the taonga of our organisation.



PWANZ does not receive any funding support from PCANZ for our UN work as an NGO with Special Consultative Status so during my term as UN Convenor I have worked hard to raise our UN profile within the PCANZ, other NZ women's networks, with Government departments, and local authorities as well as the UN bodies with whom we are associated. I have also endeavoured to find alternative ways of increasing our funds for this work and hope these efforts will help PWANZ maintain it status in the future.

It is good to hear our UN work mentioned in casual conversations in the courts of the Church, about presentations our members have given, UN focussed worship services, the extensive networking developing, and the ways in which this experience has given members a global perspective, more confidence and knowledge when speaking about issues or challenging gender inequality or on the myriad issues affecting the lives of women around the world, here in NZ and the Pacific.

Another aspect arising from each delegation is the deep friendships that form between delegation members through the shared experiences at the UN Commission, the challenges of learning about the plight of women and girls at home and abroad, and the inner educative processes that occurs in an ongoing way on returning home. After time to reflect the changes personal opinion and attitudes can be acknowledged. Each delegation member comes from a different career background, different life experiences, different church and community networks and these individual experiences feed into church and community loops.

I am very grateful, too, to the teams of women with past UN experience I have worked with each year. Their wisdom and their own experiences at the UN and new insights gained have been invaluable as the next delegation preparations are made and when quick feedback on issues has been required by the ECOSOC networks at the UN.
