# **Fulness of Life in Jagadhri**

Global Mission Coordinator the Rev. Phil King visited India in October for a meeting of overseas partners with the Church of North India. He also visited Jagadhri to catch up on developments there.

Mable time of learning for me, and of relationship building with our mission partners at the Christian Hospital and School of Nursing. This partnership extends back well over a hundred years and continues to be faithfully supported by many people in the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand. This visit enabled me to get to know the staff a little better, to meet our sponsored nursing students, and to appreciate the value of the work being achieved there. The School of Nursing offers a highly regarded Nursing Diploma that allows the graduates to get good jobs all over India, or even overseas.

At its peak the school hosts 240 students, who complete a three and a half year course. This is taught within a caring environment that is an impressive Christian witness in a community that is largely non-Christian and in some cases antagonistic to Christian values. At least half of the nursing students are from Hindu families, but they come to the school for their career training because it has such a good reputation. The centre's motto is from John 10:10, "I have come that they

might have life, and have it to the full." Supporters from the PCANZ sponsor four students, three of whom I had the pleasure of meeting while I was there. They are very grateful for the opportunity to get a good career education which would otherwise not be possible for them.

I was privileged to be welcomed as a special guest to the first year welcoming ceremony, an enjoyable evening of dancing and entertainment. Indian dancing is spectacular, so vibrant and colourful; it is a delight to witness it. It is such an amazing contrast to the conditions often encountered elsewhere in this land of contrasts.

After church in Jagadhri on Sunday morning, one of our sponsored students, Sonika Samuel, approached me and thanked me for our sponsorship of her fees, without which her parents could not afford to send her to the school. I assured her that while I was the visible presence of her sponsorship, there were many more people in New Zealand who contributed to it. I felt extremely humbled to be representing the loyal, faithful work of so many members from the PCANZ, who have helped to contribute to the lives of the Christian community in India. Meeting individuals like Sonika and seeing the difference it is making in their lives, convince me of the worth of maintaining this proud tradition of partnership with Christian Hospital and the School of Nursing.

### **School of Nursing**

The new academic year has begun and our sponsored students are doing well.

- The new flats that were built for doctors and nurses with Friends of Jagadhri funds now house several students, with some flats still to be completed. About 20 will be housed there once completed. They are very nice flats and great living spaces for the more senior students and interns.
- An extra grant that I sent from Global Mission in June for teaching resources has been used to buy models for their obstetrics class, modern equipment that they are really pleased with, and which could also be used for the degree course if it eventuates. I was encouraged to see the obvious satisfaction of the staff at having good quality resources.
- Permission to grant status for a higher level College of Nursing degree course has not been granted yet and won't be until a new building is erected, as it needs to be in a separate building to the Diploma course. Plans were drawn up some time ago but significant funds are needed for this, and discussions have taken place at Synod level re possible funding. We will keep you informed as more information comes to light about this possible new development.

patients, a government-funded initiative which will see more patients coming in to the hospital for treatment, and which will increase income as the Government pays for this. Although not huge the income will be an improvement on the current patient intake and income. It also sits well with the mission ethos of the hospital but it is too early to comment on the impact.

They are also considering the idea of developing specialist facilities to diversify and meet changing needs. But it will need to be a case of adding one at a time. Dr Cecil Harrison is planning to begin a fellowship in palliative care this year. This is one example. But they could develop other specialist care by bringing in consultants from elsewhere. There are no firm plans for anything along these lines at this stage.

The lab is working well and earning good income. The contract for testing blood samples from Railway Hospital was recently renewed and this is a major earner for them. Funds from Friends of Jagadhri have been crucial in improving the service and efficiency of the lab, and the staff are very grateful for this support.

## Somervell Parish Supports New Project

Somervell Parish in Auckland has formed a partnership with a Church of North India Secondary School in Pathankoth in North East India. This hostel project will assist poor Christian students whose parents cannot support them for higher education and training. The girls will attend Avalon School and then will be assisted into professional training such as nursing or teaching.

Each Diocese of the CNI is being challenged to establish such projects.
