PCM Partners Round Table meeting

Phil King was asked to chair this meeting which included partners from several churches around the world. The PCM gave an overview of their current mission context and shared some hopes for future development. The partners will try and maintain contact with each other to help build momentum and efficiency in their support for the PCM.

Rakhine State and southern Chin State

One of the issues that church partners were eager to learn more about was the violence and unrest in the Rakhine State involving the Rohingya Muslims. This has been a hot topic in world media with a lot of criticism levelled at Myanmar's leaders as a result. The meeting learned about the complexity of this situation. The Rakhine State is a very complicated situation involving a cocktail of ethnic unrest. While not denying the scale of violence and impact on innocent victims, some militant Rohingya have been perpetrators of violence. The unrest involves disputes between three armies: the Arakan (Rakhine) State Army who are Buddhist separatists seeking independence for the Rakhine State; the Arakan Rohingya Salvation Army, and the Myanmar military. These three have caused much violence in the Rakhine and in the southern Chin State (here the fighting is between the Arakan Army and the Myanmar army). In the southern Chin State, some PCM members and missionaries have had to evacuate due to the fighting. Travel is restricted and food costs have soared, making life very difficult. The Presbyterian Church of Myanmar mission field of Paletwa is in the southernmost area of the Chin State where these problems are occurring, so the PCM has significant involvement there. Here the problems are with the Arakan Army, not the Rohingya, as the Arakan Army camp is located near Paletwa. Both Christian and non-Christian civilians have been indirect victims of fighting that has occurred. Further comments were made that the Rohingya issue has decreased and the Arakan Army was the biggest concern, and that the problems in Paletwa have increased. The situation is complicated by the fact that the members of the PCM are themselves an ethnic minority in their own country (they are all Chin people) who have experienced oppression and restrictions by Myanmar's government. When asked for any advice from the partners, Presbyterian Church of Ireland delegate Pip Florit acknowledged the difficult challenge of sectarian violence from Ireland's history, and encouraged the PCM to find ways to act as peacemakers.

A Handful of Rice

A handful of rice is a tradition supported by Christian women in Myanmar. Each time they prepare a meal they set aside a handful of rice, and this is collected each week or month and donated to the church. It is then sold with the funds raised contributing to local church projects. In this way, the women of the church play a significant role in helping to support their church's mission and outreach. This photo shows the rice being collected at the PCM's Chin Synod church in Yangon.
