Welcome to the new edition of Mingalaba, Global Mission's Ricebowl newsletter, sharing news of the mission partnership between the PCANZ and the Presbyterian Church of Myanmar. Recent activity has seen a young adults Going Global programme at Tahan Theological College in December, and a visit by Global Mission coordinator Phil King to the PCM's General Assembly in Mindat, in the remote southern Chin State. Phil was accompanied by PCANZ members Andrew and Karen Murch of Hawera (pictured above). This visit included a chance to observe projects supported by the Ricebowl Mission in the Chin State, meet some of the recipients of project funding, attend the TTC graduation, have a project committee meeting to review progress and discuss new mission projects, and discuss plans to host three members of the PCM in New Zealand later in the year. This was the first time anyone from the PCANZ has visited the southern Chin State, which until recently was off-limits to foreigners. As Myanmar opens up politically, it has now become possible to travel freely into the Chin State. Read on ...

Going Global Myanmar 2017

In December a team of seven (five young adults and two leaders) visited Tahan Theological College (TTC) in the city of Tahan at the foot of the Chin Hills. There they took part in the college's Christmas Fun Fete and learnt about the PCANZ's relationship with the Presbyterian Church of Myanmar. One of the team members, Nicola Froud from St. Columba in Botany Downs summarized her experience this way, "I was surprised to find God in the daily, in the rhythm and heartbeat of the place, in the mundane and in the gentle nature of the people of Myanmar." Nurse Aid Scholarship Students Complete Their Training

We gave scholarships to five students to complete a nurse aid training course. Each one graduated from the course with a valuable skill that will enable them to either go on to further training or make a contribution to healthcare in their home region. The five students all came from the Chin State, with one achieving the third-place prize from their class of twelve students. The training has also given them opportunities to meet new friends from other synods within their church and grow in confidence in their lives. The report says, "We glorify Almighty God for the PCANZ who helped these young women to become strong as a result of their training." We met one of these students, from the Tedim Synod, Mawi Deih Vung. Although very shy, she was proud of her achievements and hopes to go on to complete further study.

Project Updates – It was good to see progress on recent projects we have supported, and meet some of the recipients of scholarships. Some of these are included here:

Kanpalet Church – Kanpalet is in the southern Chin State where the PCM has outreach to animist and Buddhist communities. There is some opposition to their work here, but dedicated leadership is seeing significant church growth. The church is nearing completion and will strengthen their mission capacity. The pastor of the Kanpalet church Rev. Awm Kee is below (right); beside him is the previous pastor and now D. Min student Rev. Bawi Zaw, who is the beneficiary of a Ricebowl scholarship. Both men are dedicated servants of the church in this remote part of Myanmar.





Fartlang manse – the former manse in this remote Tedim synod location was built from local materials and was destroyed in a storm in 2011. Since then the pastor has had sub-standard accommodation so this will ensure a solid home for the future.

Hakha stallrooms – this is an income generating project for the church, as well as providing accommodation and office space for the synod secretary on the top floor, so is a multi-purpose building.

are ten synods, each of which speak a different dialect; added to this, everyone also needs to communicate in the Burmese language which is different again. As you can imagine, this makes church unity challenging. We were fortunate that many members of the church can converse in English, and we were made to feel welcome.

I couldn't help but wonder at the strange collision of cultures between this ancient tribal lifestyle, and the modern world.



The PCM made an historic decision at their Assembly in agreeing to ordain a female pastor for the first time. From the Maturam Synod, Rev. Cherry will serve as a probationary pastor (this is standard) before being ordained. This is a big leap forward for the PCM. We wish Cherry God's richest blessings as she takes on this significant leadership role.

Progress Report on Plans for Wayne and Helen Harray to Serve in Myanmar

Plans for Wayne and Helen Harray to serve at Tahan Theological College are still progressing. This has involved an application to The Council for World Mission for funding and it has been a slow process to date. While this has taken much longer than we had anticipated, we are still hopeful that this might be completed in time for them to be ready to start with the new semester in June; but this depends on the paperwork being completed by CWM. Plans include Wayne developing a demonstration farm on TTC land, and for Helen to teach English and counselling practice. The slow progress is frustrating for Wayne and Helen, so please continue to pray for them and these plans as they wait for final approvals.



Congratulations to TTC Lecturer Dr. Mar Lar Myint

It was great to be able to personally congratulate TTC lecturer Mar Lar Myint (left) on achieving her Doctorate in Ministry. Mar Lar, whose specialty area is the New Testament, graduated from the Lutheran Seminary in Hong Kong in 2017. She is the first female member of the PCM to be awarded this honour. In recognition of her achievement Phil King presented Mar Lar with a gift on behalf of the PCANZ. Mar Lar visited New Zealand in 2014.

While we were present in Tahan, we were able to attend the TTC Graduation. PCANZ has contributed a great deal to TTC over the years and will be continuing to support the development of the College in the future, so it was great that we were able to spend time celebrating the completion of their academic year. Life in the Chin State

Life in the Chin State is very challenging. Work is hard with many people living subsistence lifestyles in challenging conditions. But the people are friendly and always willing to talk if they are able to converse in English, or if a translator is present. Years of neglect from the Government has had a long-term effect. Poor health and low education levels are common. It is changing slowly now but the improvement will take time to benefit society at all levels. Thank you for your support for the Ricebowl Mission in supporting the ministry of the PCM, we are helping to bring some whole-oflife improvements to the Chin people.

Want to Visit Myanmar, Have an Amazing Experience, and Teach English? They Want You!

There are opportunities for suitably qualified people with an interest in cross-cultural mission to teach short-term English courses in Myanmar. You will cover your own expenses but there may be some subsidies available on request. Options include:

- 1) A short-term course at Tahan Theological College. The College is developing a B.A. Liberal Arts programme and they have requested speakers of English to help teach the course. The length of the course depends on your availability. Time-frame is negotiable. Tahan is a pleasant location where you would be assured of a warm welcome. Accommodation would be in a reasonably priced, comfortable hotel.
- 2) Victoria Boarding School, Mindat. This would be teaching a summer school to high-school students (pictured above). Time frame would be during the months of March, April or June. The students are hungry to learn English and do not have enough teachers. Travel to Mindat and accommodation are for the slightly more intrepid; but you will be guaranteed an amazing experience as you spend time with these special young people.
