Course Description

Mission and ministry in the West are often reduced to a pragmatic search for easily adoptable models that promise immediate impact. Within that framework, leadership is reduced to implementation of these models and methods. This orientation ignores the subtler factors of how a leader influences a community and a community impacts an environment. Through this course students will examine how personal dynamics inform and shape the habits and practices of leaders. This course will also explore the ways in which mission to the West is a contextual, theological, and structural challenge that requires deep engagement in each. Students will examine how previous frameworks shaped the cultural context for ministry/mission. Students will creatively imagine alternative responses that integrate the student and their context. This course will explore that challenge with particular reference to the local church's participation in what the Spirit is doing in and for the life of the world through Jesus Christ.

ASSESSMENT TASKS AND DUE DATES

Attendance & Participation:

This course will be interactive in all aspects. Students will not only receive content through course reading assignments and lectures, but will create knowledge through conversations. Course attendance is essential. Students should come to lectures prepared to discuss the readings due for class that day.

Reading & Reflection Papers:

Each student will write reading reflection papers for each of the three required course texts. Each two-page paper (12pt. Font, double-spaced, 2cm margins) should demonstrate the student's understanding of the primary message of each book, the key insights of the book, and how those insights may affect the student's thinking and practice of missional leadership. Do not simply report what the author has written. The due dates (11:59 p.m.) are as follows:

• Creating a Missional Culture, Woodward—before class begins

- Extraordinary Leadership, Gilbert—end of week of class
- Intuitive Leadership, Keel—end of week ten
- In the Name of Jesus, Nouwen-end of exam week two*

* Additionally, each student is to read one chapter per week (over the course of the 12 week semester) of Henri Nouwen's *In the Name of Jesus: Reflections on Christian Leadership.* After reading a chapter, the student will select two to three quotes and re-type them into a document that will become a journal of quotes collected from the text. At the conclusion of the semester, the student will submit that journal along with a one page reflection on how the student's assessment of Nouwen's view of leadership.
