Moderator's sermon

The 2021 General Assembly opened the evening of 29 September with the installation of the new Moderator, Right Rev Hamish Galloway. For the first time the GA was held online due to Covid restrictions. The opening service usually involves the transfer of a ceremonial cloak and the laying on of hands by past Moderators before the gathered Commissioners of the Assembly, and is usually preceded by a powhiri. A new cloak for the Moderator

The Moderator installation service usually involves the transfer of a ceremonial cloak (Te Korowai Tapu), however, due to the online service some aspects were different. While it was not possible for Te Aka Puaho and the past Moderator, Very Rev Fakaofo Kaio, to be present for the handing over of Te Korowai Tapu, it is something that can be looked forward to at a later date. Instead, Hamish had placed upon him a different cloak with that acknowledged the Scottish heritage of the Church and his ancestry. The cloak had belonged to Very Rev Michael Thawley, and his mentor Bill Watt gave it to him (and he received it from a Moderator of the Church of Scotland)... read more on the Church website <u>GA News</u>.



Looking ahead to the Special Assembly 2022: Keynote speaker James Beck

Originally invited to be a keynote speaker at the in-person General Assembly, Moderator Right Rev Hamish Galloway plans on the Church hearing a keynote from James Beck at the 2022 Special Assembly.

When Hamish was chaplain of St Andrew's College, Christchurch, James Beck on meeting him was struck by how different he was to so many other chaplains he had interacted with. "He was then, and still is now, passionate about making the challenge of the story of Jesus relevant to our cultural contexts – and encouraging people to work through the implications of that challenge," says James.

James is deeply passionate "about the same type of work" as Hamish and has invested much of his life towards it.

"I genuinely believe that the Church is the vehicle which God is going to use to redeem and restore God's good creation, both in this age, and in the age to come. So, I am energised to help every generation understand their unique contribution towards that end," he says.

As an author, presenter, and Kaihanga o Ngā Mea at the Parenting Place for over 10 years, James has had the privilege of working across many denominations, including Presbyterian. He hopes that his observations next year will both encourage and challenge the Presbyterian expression of faith.

Thinking about Hamish's theme "Empowering Generations", James says he expects to touch on what he sees as a significant 'ache' in the Western world.

"We are richer, more educated, more industrialised and more individualistic than at any point in human history. This presents us with huge challenges and huge opportunities. As we can clearly see by our mental health statistics, our current cultural context is not providing satisfactory answers to the cosmic ache that so many humans experience. I believe that the church has a massive role to play in our world, but to be everything that she is called to be, she must reimagine her orthopraxy so that the coming generations are empowered to recontextualise and respond to the call of Jesus to 'go and make disciples'."

James believes that older generations have a key role to play by being kaitiaki - guardians of the Gospel that was handed to them. However, he also believes that the role of the older generation is to listen afresh to what the Spirit of God is whispering in this land and at this time; and to respond with open hearts and open hands. He says it is the mission of God which needs to be guarded "and that mission may take on new forms if we are courageous".

Empowering generations requires every generation to help the generation that comes after engage with the story of Jesus, James says.

"Every generation faces a different set of challenges and framing questions, which means that every generation is going to wrestle with the Gospel in a different way. A sign of the maturity of a particular church is its ability to express the gospel anew within the culture/cultures of its people. This shows the deep wisdom of the church. When the Gospel interacts with a culture, it supports what is good and wholesome in that culture, but it also challenges every culture to recognise what is incompatible with the gospel. We need to support our young people to do that process."
